

All proceeds of this lottery goes to the Children's Orchestra Society, a not-for-profit organization founded in 1962 by Dr. H.T. Ma, dedicated to "teaching the language of music" to children and teens.
- 2. The lottery begins April 15 to June 20, 2019, and may not be used in conjunction with other promotions. Deadline of submission of lottery tickets is 20 June 2019. The winners will be drawn during the Children's Orchestra Society 50th Anniversary Gala Reception at Carnegie Hall, New York City (after the Discovery Concert).
- 3. Prizes are transferable, but not convertible to cash. First Prize is ONE (1) WEEK STAY (lodging and breakfast only) in a 3-bedroom Summer House in the Hamptons, 15 minutes from Main Beach and 10 minutes to Main Street. The Children's Orchestra Society (COS) is a non-profit organization in New York City founded by Dr. Hiao Tsiun Ma (father of cellist Yo Yo Ma), for musically talented children and teens.
Since 1984, it has been under the leadership of his daughter, Dr. Yeou-Cheng Ma and her husband Michael Dadap, a multi-awarded Filipino guitarist, composer and conductor.
The COS is dedicated to "Teaching Children the Language of Music" — by providing excellent training in classical music, with a unique child-centered teaching approach that believes in a child's innate capacity to learn and develop in a friendly, supportive and cooperative environment.
The learning experience of a child at COS is not specifically to produce professional musicians, but to instill in each member the concept of invaluable experience and the benefits of music making.
COS also seeks to give performing opportunities to every student, to provide role models and mentors, and to be a bridge to the professional world, through master classes and performance collaborations with eminent musicians.

COS enriches and involves the community through performances for civic and cultural groups.

About Michael Dadap
Michael Dadap was born in the Philippines to a family of musicians.
He studied philosophy at the University of the Philippines; and, in 1971 he moved to New York

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City to study music theory and classical guitar at Mannes College of Music, and composition and conducting at Juilliard.

In reviewing COS Young Symphonic Ensemble (YSE) at New York's Town Hall on May 3, 1993, music and dance critic Bert Wechsler dubbed Michael Dadap a "fine, sensitive musician who is obviously also a mighty orchestra builder...a teacher. What drives Mr. Dadap's work is his faith in the children's capacity to learn and his energy, patience, and special talent in communicating his love for music to the children."

Mr. Dadap has recorded six CD albums for the classical guitar.

His "Intimate Guitar Classics" for solo guitar was the featured album in February 1990 on The New York Times classical radio station, WQXR.

Mr. Dadap performs as the Dadap-Ma Duo, in the United States, Asia and Europe.

He also travels annually to the Philippines to perform, teach and give workshops on Philippine Folk Instruments orchestra called the Rondalla.

He became the first recipient of the "2000 Artist of the Year Award" sponsored by the Flushing Council on the Arts in Queens.

In December 2006, he received the Pamana ng Lahi Philippine Presidential Award for his remarkable achievements as a virtuoso musician, composer, music teacher, proponent of Philippine traditional music, and for promoting Philippine culture and causes through his work.

About Darren Yang
Darren Yang, Senior at Herricks High School, began learning the double bass in 3rd Grade, and studied with Dr. Kageki Nagao since 6th Grade.
He is an Executive Board Member of Tri-M Honor Society at Herricks High School and has been selected to participate in All-State Festival in 11th & 12th Grade.
About Ray Chen
Ray Chen is a violinist who redefines what it is to be a classical musician in the 21st Century.
With a media presence that enhances and inspires the classical audience, reaching out to millions through his unprecedented online following, Ray Chen's remarkable musicianship transmits to a global audience that is reflected in his engagements with the foremost orchestras and concert halls around the world.
Initially coming to attention via the Yehudi Menuhin (2008) and Queen Elizabeth (2009) Competitions, of which he was First Prize winner, he has built a profile in Europe, Asia and the

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USA, as well as his native Australia both live and on disc.

Signed in 2017 to Decca Classics, the summer of 2017 has seen the recording of the first album of this partnership with the London Philharmonic as a succession to his previous three critically acclaimed albums on SONY, the first of which ("Virtuoso") received an ECHO Klassik Award.

Profiled as "one to watch" by the Strad and Gramophone magazines, his profile has grown to encompass his featuring in the Forbes list of 30 most influential Asians under 30, appearing in major online TV series "Mozart in the Jungle," a multi-year partnership with Giorgio Armani (who designed the cover of his Mozart album with Christoph Eschenbach) and performing at major media events such as France's Bastille Day (live to 800,000 people), the Nobel Prize Concert in Stockholm (telecast across Europe), and the BBC Proms.

He has appeared with the London Philharmonic Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra, Leipzig Gewandhausorchester, Munich Philharmonic, Filarmonica della Scala, Orchestra Nazionale della Santa Cecilia, Los Angeles Philharmonic, and upcoming debuts include the SWR Symphony, San Francisco Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony, Berlin Radio Symphony, and Bavarian Radio Chamber Orchestra.

He works with conductors such as Riccardo Chailly, Vladimir Jurowski, Sakari Oramo, Manfred Honeck, Daniele Gatti, Kirill Petrenko, Krystof Urbanski, Juraj Valcuha and many others.

From 2012-2015, he was resident at the Dortmund Konzerthaus and in 17/18 will be an "Artist Focus" with the Berlin Radio Symphony.

His presence on social media makes Ray Chen a pioneer in an artist's interaction with their audience, utilizing the new opportunities of modern technology.

His appearances and interactions with music and musicians are instantly disseminated to a new public in a contemporary and relatable way.

He is the first musician to be invited to write a lifestyle blog for the largest Italian publishing house, RCS Rizzoli (Corriere della Sera, Gazzetta dello Sport, Max).
He has been featured in Vogue magazine and is currently releasing his own design of violin case for the industry manufacturer GEWA.
His commitment to music education is paramount, and inspires the younger generation of music students with his series of self-produced videos combining comedy and music.
Through his online promotions his appearances regularly sell out and draw an entirely new demographic to the concert hall.
Born in Taiwan and raised in Australia, Ray was accepted to the Curtis Institute of Music at age 15, where he studied with Aaron Rosand and was supported by Young Concert Artists.
He plays the 1715 "Joachim" Stradivarius violin on loan from the Nippon Music Foundation.
This instrument was once owned by the famed Hungarian violinist, Joseph Joachim (1831-1907).
